Content	
Title:	Make sure your title is descriptive, containing keywords which will help with indexing and will attract readers interested in your topic.
Introduction:	In the style of newspaper articles, the first paragraph (or two) should draw the reader in. It should provide a sentence of background and flag the most important points in the blog, and introduce you, the author(s).
Body text:	The blog post should be able to be read quickly and easily, with interest and enjoyment. It should engage assessment practitioners, and researchers.
	 Provide context: why are you involved in that specific research area, policy program, assessment tool or initiative? Show what is happening: what have you done or achieved so far? Engage the reader: how will your blog benefit other readers?
Supporting content:	Include any supporting materials such as high-quality images or videos separately.
Biography:	Include a short biography (not more than 150 words) including name or names of authors, email address, and a headshot photo submitted separately in jpeg format.
Format	
Style of writing	The quality of your content has a huge impact on your reader, so create a clear, compelling blog that your audience can understand and relate to.
	 Be relatively informal in style (write as though you're talking to the reader)
	 Use short paragraphs and sentences, and avoid jargon and complex language
	o Communicate your ideas as clearly and succinctly as possible
	 Catch the eye with images (and audio, video) without breaching copyright
	Link to other pieces of your work or other sources of information
	 Invite comment and mean it! Readers may add comments on a published blog, in the comments box below it, by logging in to the website with their membership details.
